hope in God

'We will not take what is not ours'

Sermon

Lord we give you this time; speak truth through these words; breathe by your Spirit into all our thoughts and move us to decide once again to seek the things of your Kingdom

How? Ask the detractors of Jesus in John's gospel (they were Jews – religious leaders - but given the tragic history of anti-Semitism that seems to have its roots in just such words as these let's just call them 'the 'detractors of Jesus')

How? How can this son of Joseph, this Galilean, give us his flesh to eat?

How? How can this tired old world, with all its pollution and destruction, with its global warming and changing climate ever be filled with the life of God?

How? Look around...look at yourselves...look at your loved ones...read the stories of destroyed communities, nations threatened with rising sea levels,

home owners reduced to tears by floods, people in Madagascar starving after severe drought; glaciers & permafrost melting; rain forests being cut down – on & on

The stories that lead to Cop 26, with all its double-speak, managed expectations, breakthroughs, gaffes, failures and successes

Look at them all.

And as we come to take communion during COP 26, put yourselves alongside the detractors of Jesus & say 'how?'

They take everything literally, the detractors of Jesus – as often they do in John's gospel. They're like us; they're 'of the earth'

How?

Jesus doesn't answer the question. He just replies '*Those who eat my flesh and drink my blood have eternal life, and I will raise them up on the last day;*

And '*unless you eat the flesh of the Son of Man and drink his blood, you have no life in you*'.

I imagine this passage is fundamental in a Roman Catholic understanding of the Mass – transubstantiation – bread *literally* becoming the body of Christ

But never mind that –

I suppose that's a kind of answer, but I don't think any answer to the 'how?' question really works – there's no answer that would do - not to the 'how can we eat?' question, nor to the 'why must I suffer?' question, nor to the 'what does any of this mean?' question

The answer, the meaning, in fact, to any of the questions that rise in the throats of human beings in the mire of this world is – to live by faith

That's why we must take communion, during Cop 26 or at any time; it's a way of looking to Jesus - and we dare to say, in this world, to the anxious teenagers, the worried climate scientists, the conflicted politicians, the uncaring polluters and the confused consumers and to ourselves – we are all detractors of Jesus in this scenario –

To them all – to ourselves, we dare to say, and to hear, that the only place worth looking is to Jesus and he's teaching and healing, and he's getting alongside the most unlovely people, and he's hanging on a cross, and he's bursting from an empty tomb – and he's giving of himself – his flesh and blood, And he's a sign – of service, sacrifice, death and eternal life – a sign that answers the how, why and what of this human existence.

We gather here, like the detractors of Jesus, confronted by the claims of Jesus to be the Bread of Heaven. Perhaps we're asking 'how?', but we are called to believe in him, to learn of his ways and to serve and love as he served and loved – and not just to look to him as if he were just some kind of example,

But to *eat and drink of Him* – to 'take Christ to ourselves'.

In this world – in the midst of COP 26 - to take Christ to ourselves and in doing so to look to God's peaceable kingdom, of justice, fairness, peace – and, we may imagine, of clean air and sparkling water and no pollution – put so beautifully in the words of the prophet Micah

'they shall all sit under their own vines and under their own fig trees, and no one shall make them afraid;

and then we are called to live by faith in that Kingdom and to do everything to make this world *like* that Kingdom and to trust that that Kingdom is coming...is coming –
And then and only then will we know the truth of Christ's promise of eternal life – and I will raise them up on the last day..

Words of Offering

Lord, we come to you once more, with our hearts and minds open to the ways in which we have failed to live for your Kingdom and our spirits ready to move from ways of destruction to ways of justice and peace. And as ever, Lord, we would be drawn closer to Christ, who is our life; so we give of ourselves in these and all our gifts and in this bread and wine – the things of earth. As we offer them we look to their transformation into heavenly things – indeed, the things of your Kingdom.

Grace

The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit be with us evermore, Amen.

At COP26 many continue to wrestle with the difficult conundrums of moving the economy and cultures of a whole world from destructive, wasteful ways to sustainable life-giving ways, for the sake of the ever-closer future. Some have to be dragged towards such change, others are frustrated at the slowness of change; some resist change altogether; others use good words and have fine intentions; many look on anxiously; many are suffering now. In the midst of all this complexity, with our own hopes, dreams and confusions, we turn in song to the simplest Way of all – and prepare to take that Way – indeed, to take Christ – to ourselves again..:

Communion

Invitation

The table of the Lord is spread, it is for those who will come and see in broken bread and poured out wine – not mere symbols, but the very substance of his life shed for us on the Cross and raised again the third day. The risen Christ is present among his people and it is here that we meet him. It is for those who know him a little and long to know him more - the invitation is for all those who are seeking him and who are weary of their sin and doubt to come and share the feast.

Confession

How shall I repay the lord for all his benefits to me? I will take the cup of salvation and call on the name of the Lord.

Lord our God, we confess our part in a world of greed, injustice, poverty and destruction – of body, mind and spirit – a world in which many lives are destroyed by our thoughtless actions..

We confess our part in a Christian faith slow to mind its own failings and quick to condemn the failings of others.

We confess the effects of sinfulness in ourselves and the weakness of our resolve to love.

Father forgive us and bring us through this act into a fresh awareness of your grace, so that we may apprehend the true cost and glory of the gospel – in the lamb who was slain who is alive for evermore.

Institution

For I received from the Lord what I also passed on to you; the Lord Jesus on the night he was betrayed took bread, and when he had given thanks he broke it and said, take, eat, this is my body which is for you, do this in remembrance of me. In the same way after supper he took the cup saying this cup is the new covenant in my blood; do this whenever you drink it in memory of me – for whenever you eat this bread and drink this cup you proclaim the Lord's death until he comes.

Thanksgiving

Lift up your hearts, **we lift them to the Lord.**

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.

It is right to give him thanks and praise.

It is not only right, it is our duty and our joy at all times and in all places to give you thanks and praise, Holy Father, almighty and eternal God, through Jesus Christ, your only Son, our Lord.. Therefore with angels and archangels and with all the company of heaven we proclaim your great and glorious name, for ever praising you and saying

Holy Holy Holy, God of power and might.

Heaven and earth are full of your glory.

Hosanna in the highest.

Blessed is he who comes in the name of the lord.

Hosanna in the highest!

God our Father, pour out the Holy Spirit on all your people, that we may have faith, and upon these gifts of bread and wine and this eating and drinking, that this may be for us the mystery of the body and blood of our risen Lord – so that we may receive Christ to ourselves once again, for the strengthening of our faith, the assuring of our hope, and the deepening of our love.
